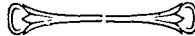

Abendonia	Abingdon, Berks.
Abula	Avila, the Roman Avela.
Ad Agrum Veranum	The Campo Verano, by the Church of St. Laurence-Without-the-Walls.
Ad duas Lauros	Originally the name of an imperial villa on the Via Labicana, later the title of the Catacombs of SS. Peter and Marcellinus.*
Ad Aquas Salvias	Now Tre Fontane, near Rome.
Ad Catacumbas	The Catacombs, strictly so called i.e. at S. Sebastiano
Ad Qurum, (Ad Querqum)	Quero, about 20 miles N.W. of Treviso.
Ad Ursum Pileatum	At "The Capped Bear," an inn sign near S. Bibiana, Rome, hence, the name of that district.
Aegca, Aegae	A town of Cilicia, now Ayash.
Aesernia	Isernia, Molise.
Alba	Alba de Tormes, near Salamanca.
Albia, Albiga	Albi, hence "Albigenses".
Alcántara	In the province of Estremadura, Spain.
Alemannia	Between the Danube, the Rhine and the Main, with (later) Alsace and German Switzerland.
Alensonium	Alencon.
Alexandria Statiellorum	Alessandria, in the territory of the Statielli, Piedmont.
Alga	I. of S. George - in - Alga, between Venice and the Mainland.

*Cf. "inter duas Lauros" (9 Sept.) where Via Latina should be Via Labicana.
